If you have any questions about the propriety of a mailing, please first clear such a mailing with the Omnilore president or vice president.


Lois Buchanan Answers Call for Koffee Kloset Mistress

Dear Mr. Jackson,

The Canal system of this country is being threatened by the spread of a new form of transportation known as "nailroads". The federal government must present the canals for the following reasons:

- If canal boats are supplanted by "railroads" serious unemployment will result. Captains, cooks, drivers, repairmen, boat builders and lock tenders will be left without means of livelihood, not to mention the numerous farmers now employed in growing hay for horses.
- Canal boats are absolutely essential to the defense of the United States. In the event of the expected trouble with England, the Enie Canal would be the only means by which we could even move the supplies so vital to waging modern war.

The government should create an Interstate Commerce Commission to protect the American people from the evils of "railroads" and to preserve the canals for posterity.

Omnilore Profiles Elyse Boozer

Vice President - Administration

Elyse Boozer is that rare creature; a child of Los Angeles. Although she was born in Weehawken, New Jersey, she came to Los Angeles by train at the age of two. Raised by a single mother who earned her living doing photographic touch up work at the Hollywood studios, Elyse grew up as a latch-key child in the Palms-Culver City area.

During the McCarthy era, her mother was blacklisted by the studios for registering as a member of the Progressive Party which backed Henry Wallace for president. She subsequently went to work for Paul Hesse, Sunset Strip photographer.

Although her mother was no longer associated with the motion picture industry, Elyse was. As a starstruck youngster who lived just two blocks from MGM, she spent her days collecting autographs at the back gate of the MGM studios, winding up with six star- studded autograph books.

As a result of having skipped three grades in elementary school, Elyse found herself surrounded by a much older peer group and made her friends among the pages of books. She entered high school at the age of 12; and after entering junior college a few years later, she decided to pursue the self-taught path to education. A voracious reader, she was interested in everything from volcanoes to indigenous people.

After an early marriage and motherhood, she divorced and went to work as a girl Friday. She remarried, had a son, and returned to work at Litton Industries in 1961. She began her 31-year stint at Litton as a clerk, worked her way up in the supervisory ranks and retired two years age as a manager.

Becoming interested in travel after her second divorce, Elyse planned one special trip a year. Her son's favorite was the raft trip they took together down the Colorado River through the Grand Canyon the summer he was 14 years old. In the two years since her retirement, Elyse has chalked up a dozen trips. In addition, she does volunteer work for the National Kidney Foundation. She became a volunteer after doing a hand-holding stint in the Surgical Waiting Area at UCLA Hospital.

Her California daughter recently retired from the Navy after serving 24 years and is raising a four year old daughter. In addition to visiting them, Elyse enjoys traveling to Wellesley, Massachusetts where her son, the vice-president of a software firm, lives with his wife, two year old son, and two month old daughter.

ELyse's favorite trip since retirement was the tour of Russia she took last summer. Because she expressed so much interest in off-the beaten-path experiences, the tour guide in St. Petersburg took her on her own to see many non-tourist sights; and the two still correspond. To date Elyse has participated in four Elderhostels. At the moment she is looking forward to spending two weeks at the end of January at Snow Mountain Ranch YMCA of the Rockies in Colorado where she will be taking classes in snowshoeing and cross country skiing.
