

#### Omnilore Library Opens for Business



Realizing a dream that has been almost two years in the making, Omnilore has finally set up its own library under the chairmanship of Joyce Zima. The library is located on bookshelves in the locked cabinet in Room 8. Maps, articles, and past discussion outlines are in the file cabinet.

The library cabinet will be opened before each study/discussion group meeting and locked at the end of the meeting by the group coordinator or designated person.

#### HOW WILL IT WORK? --

According to Joyce, "Everyone is an honorary librarian. You check out and return books and maps yourself."

CHECKOUT PROCEDURE: If you wish to check out a book, remove the card from the holder facing the front cover, print your name and the current date on the back of the card and file the card in the 3x5 file box on the book shelf under the corresponding color.

RETURN PROCEDURE: When you return your book, find the card in the file box. cross off your name, replace the card in

the holder of the book, and then replace the material in the appropriate colored section on the shelves or in the file cabinet.

CHECKOUT PERIOD: All materials may be checked out for one month.

A few specialized dictionaries (identified by white cards) are for in room use only and cannot be checked out. Past outlines and articles are also for in room use only. If you want a copy of an outline or article, place it in the Copy Wanted envelope along with your name, study discussion group name, meeting time and place and 10¢ for each page you want copied. Copies will be returned by your study/discussion group coordinator.

To introduce new and prospective members to the Omnilore organization, a morning coffee was held by the membership committe Tuesday, January 18 at the Redondo beach campus.


Following self introductions,

### Omnilore Profiles Vi Graham

When young Willard Graham took his first look at the tall twelve year old blonde in junior high school, his boyish heart was smitten and he swore that some day he would marry her. That vow came true; Vi and Wil Graham celebrated their golden wedding anniversary three years ago.

Although she met Willard in Los Angeles, Vi was an Eastern transplant. Born on Staten Island, N.Y., she lived on the East Coast until the age of seven. After graduating from Franklin High in Los Angeles, Vi attended U.C.L.A., U. S. C. and Loyola Universities receiving degrees in economics and sociology and a teaching credential as a reading specialist.

Not content with settling into a solitary career, Vi chalked up successful careers in several fields. She served as a social worker for the State of California, worked as a bank escrow officer, taught remedial reading and became an entrepreneur for several years designing and marketing jewelry targeted towards tennis and bicycle buffs.

A tennis buff all her life, Vi finished first in the State of California tennis doubles in her age bracket in 1992 and second in the national doubles the same year. Back in 1959 she hosted the first meeting of the Palos Verdes Tennis Club at her home. She served on the original board of the Palos Verdes League of Woman Voters, has held membership in the Palos Verdes Chapter of the United Nations and has been active in Great Books for many years. In addition, she is a member of American Association of University Women and the Friends of the Library.

A member of OmniLore since it started in 1992, she has served on the membership committee and as a coordinator of the study/discussion group on the Republics of the Former USSR.

Vi's interests range from bridge to politics. With travel high on her list, Vi and Willard (a retired attorney) have visited China (where she promoted tennis for our government among the Chinese people), Turkey, England, Wales, Italy, the Scandinavian Countries and India. The Grahams have participated in over 50 weeks of Elderhostel; and have served as coordinators of several Elderhostel programs.

They have one daughter, who is an expert in graphic arts and computer sciences, and a grand daughter, who is a fine arts expert.

Reflecting on more than half a century of accomplishments in both the professional and volunteer arenas, Vi attributes her success to one person -- her childhood sweetheart, Wil." I couldn't have done half the things I did if it wasn't for Willards constant support."


#### "CONTEMPORARY ISSUES" DISCUSSION GROUPS SEEK LEADERS
