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### Japanese-American Internee to be Speaker at Luncheon Forum in May

H. E. Kamiya, one of our new **Omnilore** members, will speak at the next Forum Luncheon about his experiences in a relocation center during World War II. The luncheon will be held on Wednesday, May 31st at 11:30 a.m., at the Elks Club in Redondo Beach (315 Esplanade).\* We hope you'll join us for a wonderful social and informative event.

After receiving his M.S. in engineering from UCLA, Mr. Kamiya worked for many years as a systems analyst for Aerospace Corporation, Northrop and RAND.

H.E. has spoken about the Japanese-American internment at many schools in Southern California. He will describe for us the challenges to the internees of returning from relocation camp and the difficulties of re-establishing their lives, as well as the lasting impact on Japanese-American families and community. H.E. will happily entertain questions from the audience.

Ancient Civilizations/ Archeology	Kathryn Josef George Muse 1st & 3rd Thurs. p.m.	This group will attempt to create an awareness of our roots by studyin ancient civilizations including those in the Fertile Crescent, India, China North and South America.		
Great Decisions	James O'Neill 1st & 3rd Mon. p.m.	Using the core book, "Great Decisions 2000", this group will discuss eight important policy issues including U.S. Interests in the World, Russia: Report Card for Survival, Middle East Realignments and The Euro's Challenge to the Dollar.		
Gardens of the Palos Verdes Peninsula	Jean Levanas 2nd & 4th Tues. p.m.	This group will enhance their botanical knowledge and develop an understanding of the mental relaxation and health benefits derived from gardening by studying the varied and unusual gardens of the Palos Verdes Peninsula.

#### **OMNILORE PROFILE – JOANNE PAGE**

Interested in art, museums and libraries since childhood, it was no surprise that Joanne Page became an art conservator at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art after dabbling briefly in other pursuits as an adult.

Until her retirement five years ago, she was a paper conservator at LACMA, working with art forms on paper – prints, drawings, watercolors, and rare books. Since her retirement she has been doing freelance work at home for individual collectors and small museums such as the Pacific Asian Museum in Pasadena.

After growing up in Chicago, Joanne attended Northwestern University where she received her degree in theatre. In the year following graduation she went to New York to pursue an acting career, but instead found employment as a model and dancing as an extra at the Metropolitan Opera.

She quickly realized that a career on Broadway was not in the cards. Instead she married and moved to Mexico City for two years where her husband was a student at Mexico City College. While he was in college she worked as a secretary to the librarian at the college. Following his graduation, they moved to Madison, Wisconsin where he studied for his masters degree in economics and she worked as a secretary. Following his graduation,

they moved to Connecticut. During their four years in Hartford, their two daughters were born.

In 1963 they moved to California and settled in Rancho Palos Verdes. A perpetual student, Joanne was always taking classes, and along the way picked up a bachelors degree in art history at Cal State Dominguez Hills and enrolled in museum study classes offered by UCLA Extension. Meanwhile, Joanne volunteered at the Palos Verdes Art Center. She and a friend installed all the exhibits there for a number of years.

When a family friend who is an authority on art of the Asian Steppes served as a consultant at LACMA, she heard of an internship that she recommended Joanne look into.

Joanne began her career at LACMA in 1978 in the technical services department as assistant preparator. Her work involved installation of exhibitions and preparation of exhibitions.

During this time Joanne completed bookbinding classes at UCLA and began thinking in terms of working in the conservation department – which restores art work in collections and also concerns itself with storage, light levels, humidity, and temperature in the galleries and storage areas.

She started work in the conservation lab as a research assistant responsible for library conservation, assisting the conservators when they needed help. She particularly loved bookbinding. After three years as an apprentice in the paper lab, she was named assistant conservator, and remained in that position until her retirement.

A recent newcomer to **Omnilore**, Joanne is program chairman for the California chapter of the Guild of Bookworkers, a professional organization for people in book arts. She takes Tai Chi classes., is a member of the Movable Book Society (which deals with antique pop-up books) and attends the Shakespeare Festival in Ashland, Oregon each year. Next month she will travel to Telluride, Colorado to attend a class in gold tooling by hand, sponsored by the American Academy of Bookbinders.

An artist and writer as well as a bookbinder, Joanne has written, illustrated and bound the book, "Mrs. Noah's Plan," a children's book dealing with the saving of the plants during the flood by Noah's wife whom Joanne says "never received enough credit for her contribution."

#### Fritz Runge Kicks Off Forum Series

Kicking off the Forum series for the year 2000 was a talk by Fritz Runge, retired director of the McDonnell Douglas international space station program.


At a meeting held at the Raffaello Restaurant in San Pedro on Leap Day, February 29th, Runge gave an update on space activities in earth orbit – manned and unmanned. He traced his own personal experiences in such pioneering projects, and he spoke of the space station evolution and how the future station will be used.

While the U.S. was involved in the lunar landing project, the Soviets developed MIR, a space station that is still in orbit. The next big space station will be sponsored by an international group. Its payloads will include micro gravity industrial research and products,
