Spring Forum to Look at Election Process What Happens Now?

The Future of Elections, Campaign Financing, Your Tax Cut

How lucky we are to have **Professor Richard L. Palmer**, Cal State University, Dominguez Hills, speaking on these very current and relevant topics at our Spring Forum, to be held on Wednesday, May 30th at the Los Verdes Country Club.

Professor Palmer, known to those **Omnilore** members who attended his class at the University, is eminently qualified to address these issues. He is a graduate of Sacramento State College (B.A., 1966) and Claremont Graduate School (Ph.D., 1973). His teaching experience, which continues today, commenced in 1970. Professor Palmer's academic administrative experience ranges from having chaired the Department of Political Science, to Acting Associative Vice President for Academic Resources and Planning, and includes a tenure as Dean of the School of Social and Behavior Sciences. His research and scholarly pursuits have covered topics such as Post-War America, Absentee Ballot Reform in California, Voter Behavior in California, and Citizen Participation/Representation Under Public Law 93-641.

Given the existing conditions in both Washington and Sacramento, we are indeed fortunate to have such a knowledgeable and excellent speaker/teacher as our guest at the Spring Forum, to be held at the Los Verdes Country Club, 7000 W. Los Verdes Drive, Rancho Palos Verdes.*

OMNILORE PROFILE – ANNE FAASS, MEMBER-AT-LARGE

Can a woman have it all? This is a question many women have asked. Our newest Board member, Anne Faass has at various times in her life been a successful computer professional, a wife, a mother, and a caring daughter, as well as a passionate volunteer to two of her favorite causes: Planned Parenthood and the Democratic Party.

Anne was born in Garden City, on Long Island, New York. She spent her childhood on Long Island and left for boarding school in New Hope, Pennsylvania in the 10th grade. This was in preparation for four years at Byrn Mawr where she graduated in 1957 with a degree in economics.

As was typical of the times for women, this prepared her to take a position at Mutual of New York where she was accepted in the "Girls" College Training Program and put to work proofreading insurance policies. Shortly thereafter she moved to Philadelphia to be closer to many of her friends and went to work at INA (now CIGNA) as a programmer trainee in the newly emerging field of computers. It was here in 1962 that she met and married Dick, her husband of almost 40 years. He liked to ski and she liked the beach, so it was natural for them to move to California the following year and settle in the South Bay.

At this time she went to work at TRW

as a programmer/analyst in Management Systems. During her sixteen-year stint at the company she became an acknowledged expert in the field of software development and structured programming, traveling throughout the country presenting many technical papers and conducting workshops for the AIIE (American Institute of Industrial Engineers). While functioning in this position, Anne was listed in Who's Who in the West and Who's Who in Business and Finance. During this time she also had two boys, Kenneth born in 1963 & Alan in 1966.

After sixteen years, with Dick's career going well as Head of Engineering at International Light Metals in Torrance, Anne decided to leave TRW to become a housewife and mother. During the next several years, besides taking care of her family, Anne obtained a real estate license, learned how to manage her financial portfolio and was able to spend quality time with her ailing mother.

Starting in the early 1980's, she started devoting her time, energy and passions first to Planned Parenthood and then the Democratic Party. When she first joined the South Bay Friends of Planned Parenthood, the organization tried to keep a low profile due to public sentiment. They met in private homes and in general kept their presence low

key. She was on the original clinic defense team when the Lomita Clinic opened (they now use professional security guards to handle their function). She is currently on the SBFPP board and was recently chairman of their local annual benefit event.

As an active member of the Palos Verdes Democratic Club, she is their current secretary. Anne is on the 53rd Assembly District Committee which selected her as a delegate to the state convention just held in Anaheim. She was also named the Democratic Woman of the Year from the 53rd District and will be honored at a banquet later this year.

In her "spare time," Anne takes painting lessons at the P.V. Art Center and is in an intermediate T'ai Chi class. She and Dick have also traveled extensively to places such as Russia, Africa and Europe.

Anne has been in Omnilore for five years, is currently a member-at-large on the Omnilore Board of Directors and is the coordinator of the current class The Quest for Cosmic Justice.


