

Space Scientist To Speak At Forum


Fritz Runge, retired director of the McDonnell Douglas International space station program, will discuss *Manned Space Flights* at a Forum luncheon to be held Tuesday, February 29th at 11:30 a.m. at Raffaello Ristorante, 400 S. Pacific Avenue, San Pedro.

Runge will provide an update of space acdtivities in earth orbit, including his work in the early launch

OMNILORE PROFILE - HELEN LEVEN - CURRICULUM CHAIRMAN

While still in high school, New Yorker Helen Leven embarked on a life-long hobby that paid off – appearing on television as a quiz show contestant. Her first taste of success came at the age of 16 when she stumped the experts on *What's My Line*. Her line? A parttime job modeling maternity clothes.

In the years since, she has won prizes on such programs as *Treasure Hunt* (hosted by Jan Murray in Chicago), the daytime version of *Jeopardy* (hosted by Art Fleming), and *Charge Account*, on which she appeared for a week while racking up prizes that included: a trip to Puerto Rico, a Caribbean cruise, a vacation in the Catskill Mountains, a diamond bracelet, a trailer, a room of Ethan Allen furniture, a washer and dryer, and a year's supply of salami.

After six months at Queens College, Helen dropped out to become a housewife and mother. Three years later a burning desire to learn resulted in her striking a compromise between child-rearing and getting an education taking courses over the radio and enrolling in night college. While she supervised her three children at a playground in the daytime, she did her homework on the park bench. received her bachelors degree education from Queens College 1966, and later earned a masters in education from St. Johns University in Queens and a professional diploma in administration and supervision at C.W.

Post College of Long Island University.

During a six-week teacher strike, Helen donned fishnet stockings and a leotard and worked as a cocktail hostess at a New York restaurant, discovering in the process that cocktail hostesses make more money in one week than a teacher does in a month.

Six years before she retired, Helen was directed by the local school board of District 28 in Queens to serve as curriculum coordinator for language arts, social studies and family living for 27 schools involving 28,000 students. She served as a liaison between the board and her school district. After a brief stint as a head hunter, Helen returned to consulting for the district for one more year. While working as a consultant for the district, she also taught at St. Johns University, supervising student teachers.

During this time Helen was employed as a free-lance writer for trade shows, composing lyrics for such production companies as Fruit of the Loom, Union Underwear, and Arrow Tool Sheds.

When she moved to California seven years ago to join her children, she took the California teaching exam and then became licensed as a teacher-social worker for the film industry. She worked until the past year on the sets of commercials featuring children. Her classes consisted of anywhere from one to ten children ranging in age from six weeks to 17 years.



One of the highlights of her life was the time she went on an


archeological dig in Bakers Cove, Texas as a member of Earthwatch. She climbed to the top of a mountain and rappelled into a cover where she spent 17 days unearthing artifacts which proved that people lived in that area 10,000 years ago. Following the dig, she authored an article explaining the dig which was published on page one of the *New York* Times travel section. (The dig was also featured in an article in *Fortune Magazine*.)

Professional achievements include setting up a program for teaching debate at the sixth grade which was adopted for use throughout the five boroughs of New York City and developing an animated computer program with her students which dealt with the history of the Brooklyn Bridge. The animated computer program was placed in a time capsule at the base of the Brooklyn Bridge.

Helen's hobbies include travel, reading, the Internet, and her grandchildren. She has been a mentor for the past year and a half.


