

Sculptors and Sculpture Group Deemed "Enormous Success"

The Spring Sculptors and Sculpture study/discussion group was deemed an enormous success by the eight students who completed the class - two of whom are true sculptors and one of whom had dabbled sufficiently to know the art's difficulties. Before participating in this class, this writer had always regarded sculpture as something one must pass by en route to the paintings. Not Anymore! Sculptor Alfred Bernstein guided the group in a discussion of the aesthetics of the art of sculpture and displayed his own work. Also displaying his own creation was sculptor George Clark, whose original work demonstrated the Lost Wax technique.

Other presentations dealt with works by Alexander Calder, Remington, Adrian de Vries, Rodin, Henry Moore and with Romanesque sculpture.

At the final classroom session, class members shared sculptures they brought from home. Items ranged from glass figures, book-ends and wooden bowls to art created by class members and their children.

The final meeting of the group took place at the Palos Verdes Art Center where members viewed and discussed the outdoor Big Sculpture Exhibit.

"H.E." Kamiya Discusses Experiences as an Internee

Omnilorian Eiichi "H.E." Kamiya, who was interned with his family at one of the ten U.S. camps for Japanese-Americans during World War II, discussed his experiences as an internee at the May 31st Forum held at the Elks Club in Redondo Beach.

The son of a principal of a Japanese language and culture school in the Long Beach area, H.E. was nine years old when the war started.

The immediate reaction of the U.S, government when the war began, according to H.E. was to suspect anyone of Japanese ancestry – even those like his father and mother who were American citizens. Rounded up with hundreds of other Japanese-Americans, the Kamiya family was held at the Santa Anita Race Track (where their beds consisted of gunny sacks and straw) pending their assignment to a camp in southern Arkansas, where they endured hot, humid weather and swampy ground.

Although it was not an easy life for the internees, H.E. stated they quietly accepted the ordeals of leaving home, losing their freedom and living in harsh Japanese community." conditions. Most adjusted to what they had to accept. "If the adults felt that the

American Constitution had failed them, they kept those feelings from the children," he said.

H.E. was able to

find the positive aspects of The children could go experience. anywhere, even slip under the fence and go exploring. They learned to make toys out of simple materials and grew to be quite independent.

The impact of the relocation camps proved to be immense. Until this experience, he explained, Americans of Japanese heritage had kept to themselves in both social and business worlds: now they learned a new way of Strict family ties broke down. life. Parents felt it necessary to prove their loyalty to the U.S.; so when the ordeal was over, they pushed their children to "Be the best."

"Those children went on to be the generation of super achievers," H.E. said. "It changed forever the lives in the

OMNILORE PROFILE - SAM RIFMAN

Although Sam Rifman only retired a year ago – July 1, 1999 – and has only been a member of **Omnilore** for the past 12 months, it was no surprise that he accepted the job of coordinator of the *Famous Trials* course this semester. For Sam is no newcomer to the legal process. As a child growing up in Baltimore, Sam loved to visit the municipal court where his father was a judge, and listen to the cases on his father's docket. And he takes pride in his father's appointment to the Ecclesiastical Court by the Catholic Archdiocese of Baltimore.

But when it came time to choose his own profession, Sam went in a different direction, choosing to become an electrical engineer. He received both his bachelor's degree and Ph.D. from the Johns Hopkins University.

While in college he had a number of interesting summer jobs. Apart from a couple of summers working for the National Security Agency, he worked mostly with what he laughingly refers to as "handling cold stuff in the middle of summer." One such job consisted of measuring the performance characteristics of experimental skis for Howard Head, founder of the Head Ski Company. Another summer position – as research assistant at Johns Hopkins on an Atomic Energy Commission project – resulted in a case of frostbite from handling cryogenic gasses (liquid helium and liquid nitrogen).

Upon receiving his doctorate, he left Baltimore and "summer cold stuff" behind to accept a position in sunny Southern California with TRW, where he became a project engineer and spent

his entire 30-year professional life.

During that time he was involved in a number of interesting projects. One of his first assignments, performed in conjunction with NASA and JPL, involved enhancing pictures of a future landing site on the moon (taken by Apollo astronauts) using digital imaging processing.

As a project manager he collaborated on a program with the Israelis on unmanned aerial vehicles (UAV's), remotely controlled unmanned aircraft. They designed shelters that contained the computers and displays and software to control the UAV's in flight. TRW rented a little airport in New Mexico where they were tested.

He also worked on remote sensing from satellites, devising computer systems that processed data from the earth resources satellites. TRW sold these services to both the U.S. government and the Japanese government, which involved Sam's making business trips to Japan. He also sold these services to major petroleum companies, for the exploration of mineral resources.

Four years after his 1972 marriage to Eileen, the Rifmans were sent to Alexandria, VA where Sam spent his days working on advance image processing techniques and building digital maps of the earth, and the young couple spent their weekends

participating in all sorts of special events connected with the bicentennial.


When the six-month assignment was up Sam and Eileen returned to the South Bay, living in Redondo Beach before moving to the house in Manhattan Beach that has been home for the past 17 years.

An avid cyclist, Sam rode his bicycle to San Diego a couple of weeks ago, chalking up nearly 100 miles one way. Since his retirement, one of his major occupations has been investing the retirement money in his portfolio. In addition, his hobby of collecting handmade native pottery has taken him on jaunts to the Mexican village of Mata Ortiz where the natives re-invented the ancient art of painting designs with a special brush consisting of a single hair of a child and then firing up the pottery in the ancient manner (using manure for fuel). He also takes yoga and Tai Chi classes regularly.

Sam and Eileen are the parents of two children – a 19-year-old son who just completed his first year in the Army and will shortly be heading for Alaska, and a 14-year-old daughter who will enter Mira Costa High School this Fall.
