Professor of Music barely begins to describe the extent of the functions and achievements of **Dr. Hansonia Caldwell**, speaker for the Forum to be held at the Los Verdes Country Club, Wednesday, July 30th, at 11:30 a.m.

To name just a few of her myriad activities, she has since 1972 taught courses in African American Music, Arts and Social Protest, Music Appreciation and History, as well as a graduate



seminar in music in the city. She founded and conducts the Dominguez Hills Jubilee Choir, which in addition to international performances, including New York's Carnegie Hall and an upcoming concert tour of Great Britain, supports youth programs from summer arts camps to outreach in public schools.

She is a speaker of extraordinary skill. While her topics have covered everything from standards for teachers of music, to advocating arts education before legislative groups, we are fortunate to be able to hear her on what is clearly a topic of special passion for her: the music and musicians that define what we know as the Harlem Renaissance. Information Bytes from the Computer & Technology Special Interest Group

Recent additions to **Omnilore's** technical capabilities include a personal computer and internet access.

Omnilore PC Is An Available Resource

Omnilore has a PC with monitor, keyboard and mouse given by **Carol Johnson**. It has become quite a joint project. **Milton Holmen** gave it a printer. **Bob Saunders** gave a Windows 98 upgrade, a faster modem and a USB port. **Chuck Herring** gave an external zip drive. Bob has done most of the installation; others involved have been **Myron Pullen**, Carol and **Mary Barling**.

Software includes Outlook Express for e-mail, Internet Explorer for internet browsing and Office 97, including Word for word processing, Excel for spreadsheets and PowerPoint for presentation "slides." Hardware includes a small hard drive, a CD drive and a floppy disk drive, besides the zip drive.

The PC is stored in the equipment closet in Room 8 and can be used briefly there or rolled out into the room for a presentation. It can be connected to the video projector in order to display on a large screen. It can be used in a variety of ways. One possibility is to build a set of displays on a home PC and bring it in to Room 8 on a CD or one or more floppies.

There is a login password known to Carol, Myron, Bob, Mary and **George Clark**. If you want to use the PC, you can get the password from one of them. If you put any files on the hard disk, please make a folder with your name under My Documents and store them there.

The Internet Comes to Omnilore

A telephone line has recently been installed in the two *Omnilore* classrooms at Franklin Center. There are two outlets in each room, so that access can be made from the front or rear of either room. This is a standard telephone line, so that it may also be used for incoming or outgoing voice phone if needed.

Internet access has been set up and tested for a couple of existing ISP accounts by two members from the *Omnilore* PC in Room 8, and a similar setup can be made for others who would like to make use of the PC for Internet access. All that is necessary to establish such access is to have an existing modem dialup ISP account.

If you would like to establish such access to your dialup account, identify a toll-free number for your ISP from the 310-370-#### exchange and your account ID. The password will be needed only when you make the actual connection and does not need to be stored in the computer; so your account privacy will be maintained. If you have this information and would like to setup a dialup module, see Myron Pullen or Carol Johnson for assistance in doing the setup.

An alternative is available if you have access to a laptop computer and a dialup ISP account. In this case, you need only have your laptop available with you and connect it to the telephone line via one of the standard outlets available in each room. You can then access the Internet in exactly the same manner as you do on any other occasion. Check with Myron or Carol for the location of the telephone outlets.

Just think of it! You can now include access to Internet resources as part of your class presentation. When this valuable aid is added to the recently acquired video projector, you can bring the power of the Internet right into the classroom and use it as one more effective way of making your presentation.

This tool can also be used by our special interest groups, such as the Computer & Technology Special Interest Group, which meets the 2nd and 4th Fridays of the month at 3:15 to 5:15 p.m. or by the Brown Bag Science lecture series, which meets on the first Thursday of each month at lunch time (12:00 to 1:00 p.m.)

In between she taught pre-school for seven years and worked at McDonald Douglas for four years. As director, she hires the counselors, writes proposals, and tries to get grant money for the Hermosa Beach-based organization which she describes as a not-for-profit counseling program for atrisk children.

Jackie and husband, John, who became an attorney after a 35-year career managing grocery stores, love to travel. They've been all over the world -Russia, Japan, Singapore, all of Europe, Morocco, Malaysia, New Zealand, and all but three of the United States.


