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Forum Speaker Discloses Secrets

Parely have examples of "learning the hard way" been described more vividly than those presented by **Patricia Hamilton** at our January Forum. When she informed us that the personal incidents she was going to tell were unknown to her boss at CSUDH, who was present, the incidents became all the more enticing.

With the insight, clarity and knowledge gained from many travels (to 65 countries), much study, (as much as possible before going to a new place), and a sheer love of adventure and exploration, she told us how she had escaped from a Uganda prison and how she had avoided marriage to an absolute stranger in Bora Bora. Never mind that the former sounded like a chapter from Kafka's *The Trial*, nor that the near-husband was an unknown elder of an unknown tribe; and never mind that her rescue in both of these situations was engineered by heretofore unknown Italians, *Omnilorians* were enraptured by the words of a woman who could look at her experiences with humor and appreciation. (I would conjecture that her boss was enraptured, too!)

Additionally, we were treated to a wealth of cultural taboos and information testifying to Ms. Hamilton's knowledge of specific customs in specific cultures, and to her belief in her own admonition to "find out all you can about a country to which you are traveling." Needless to say, this practice was instituted in the years *after* the above-mentioned experiences!

A few examples: the Hindu honor of elephants as deities; wearing white as a sign of mourning in Cambodia; avoidance of beef in India and pork and shellfish by Jews and Moslems everywhere; the aroma of garlic to ward off evil spirits in Sweden; using one's fingers to eat in Morocco, etc.

Finally, and with absolute conviction, Ms. Hamilton gave us what is clearly her credo, and which would serve us all well: "Embrace people from all over the world, and accept them for who they are."

On the first Thursday of March, Patricia Edie will examine the degree to which Darwinian Theory applies to the field of psychology - to what degree did natural selection evolve the structure of the mind? Patricia will summarize the chronological progression of various hypotheses and models about human nature and the mind; explain the Blank Slate Theory and alternate opinions. She'll define Evolutionary Psychology and present the views of proponents and opponents. She'll also present the most current approach of neurobiologists, "Cultural Biology," with pro and con views.

On the first Thursday of April come hear Terry Savage discuss alternative theories regarding our unique language ability. Linguistic theories impact the language learning approaches of teachers and students and have application for work on artificial intelligence. How does the mind create language? What are the characteristics and commonalities of the more than 6,000 extant languages? Why do children learn languages so easily? Terry will evaluate the theories as espoused by scientific derkind Noam Chomsky, as well as many not-so-famous worldwide cognitive scientists who focus on this subject.

OMNILORE PROFILE - CHRISTINE RHODES

Born in Springfield, Illinois, Christine Rhodes, who is currently professor emeritus at the College of the Desert in Palm Desert, has spent her life in both Illinois and California

A member of Phi Theta Kappa sorority at Springfield College, Illinois, Christine taught in a one-room schoolhouse in central Illinois for two years before returning to college. Recipient of several scholarships, Christine attended classes at Illinois Wesleyan, the University of Denver, and the University of Redlands where she received her masters degree in music.

While at Illinois Wesleyan she married her professor, Harry Tomlinson, a professional musician, in 1946.

After they moved to Palm Springs she became professor of music at the College of the Desert. Five years ago the college inscribed her name on the Campus Walk of Knowledge.

Active in music circles in the Palm Springs area for three decades, Christine and Harry founded the Palm Springs Chorale which performed many major oratorios and choral works, and the Palm Springs Music Society which featured concert artists of the stature of Joseph Szigeti. With Harpo Marx on their board they enlisted Jack Benny to star in a benefit concert for the United Fund. Under Harry's direction, accompanied by Christine, the chorale

performed before a sold-out house that evening.

Christine and Harry raised three sons during their desert years before he passed away in 1975. In addition to her college responsibilities, Christine served as organist and choirmaster at several churches in the Palm Springs area, as well as serving as music director for the community's synagogue for 33 years. She became so interested in the Hebrew language while singing at the temple that she decided to study the language; and became so adept that she was able to assist students preparing for their Bar Mitzvahs and Bat Mitzvahs.

After her retirement she married Henry Rhodes, a retired marine engineer from Redondo Beach. For 17 years they traveled the world. They made train journeys across Europe, Asia, Africa and Australia. During a seven-week train jaunt from London to Hong Kong in 1981 they visited every country in Europe with the exception of Albania. They made a coastal trip from Norway to Kirkenes beyond the artic circle.

They took a train again when they went from Cairo, Egypt to Cape Town, South Africa, and especially enjoyed Zimbabwe and Tanzania where they went on animal safaris.

In Malaysia they cruised from Singapore to Kuala Lumpur where they met up with Australian friends whom they subsequently visited on a cross-country train trip across Australia.

When they cruised the Pacific they stopped at the Marquesas, remote islands en route to Hawaii.

In South America they visited every country except Venezuela and some small countries on the east coast. They crossed Lake Titicaca, the highest lake in the world, in a row boat.

Since moving to this area Christine has enjoyed attending performances at the Ahmanson Theatre and Mark Taper Forum. She joined *Omnilore* after being widowed in 1995.

She is currently studying Spanish with both a private group and an adult education class. In addition, she practices yoga and Tai Chi and attends two series of Los Angeles Philharmonic concerts every season.


In her spare time she entertains her three sons (one from Palm Springs and two from Seattle), three grandsons, and three granddaughters. This April she will become a great grandmother.

Currently Christine serves as member-atlarge on the *Omnilore* Board of Directors.


The Lewis and Clark Trail



Eighth Annual Downtown Walk Set for April 11th




