Cal Humanities: A State of Open Mind

iewing the lists of her credits, it might appear that our speaker for the April 29 Forum, Dr. Kenya Davis-Hayes, has made the Mission Statement of Cal Humanities, the organization she will tell us about at our Spring Forum luncheon, her own personal mission. The statement is:

Kenya Davis-Hayes

"To connect Californians to ideas and one another in order to understand our shared heritage and diverse cultures, inspire civic participation, and shape our future."

Dr. Davis-Hayes is an active Board member of Cal Humanities, which was founded in 1975 as the California Council for the Humanities, a granting organization and independent non-profit partner of the National Endowment for the Humanities. Over the years, the group has grown and evolved, now promoting the humanities as relevant and necessary by creating, producing, funding, and supporting "humanities-based projects and programs, eve-opening cultural experiences, and meaningful conversations."

Dr. Davis-Hayes not only earned her Ph.D. from Purdue University; she started her teaching career there. She served as teaching assistant in several departments from 2000 to 2005. Her subjects were "Curriculum and Instruction," "U.S. History" and "Native American History." From there, Dr. Davis-Hayes proceeded to the Chinese Academic Social Sciences at Campbell University in North Carolina, to Johns Hopkins, and then to Excelsior College, where she currently holds the position of Online Faculty Advisor [for] African American History, Civil War History, and History of Women in America, which is a reflection of another major component of the doctor's portfolio: women's issues, both local and international.

Her affiliation with Cal Humanities began in 2007, when then-Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger appointed her to the Board. This was followed in short order by Board membership in the Women's Empowerment Foundation and the International Visitor's Council.

Finally, and it is almost beyond imagining, this remarkable woman finds time for interests and hobbies: television and film history, fashion history, and global travel, including efficient ways of packing!

Dr. Davis-Hayes has a rich and timely repertoire of humanities-related topics from which to choose, and we look forward to her presentation at the Forum during the last week in April at our ever-friendly and accommodating Los Verdes Country Club, south on Hawthorne Blvd., this side of the blue Pacific. MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

elcome, new Omnilore members! We are pleased that you have joined us and look forward to meeting you in Omnilore activities available to you: the study and discussion groups (SDGs), special interest groups (SIGs), and our quarterly Forum luncheons. We hope you will also decide to contribute your talents to our all-volunteer functions as group coordinators, committee members and/or leaders of other activities.

As 2015 unfolds, we have some updates in our volunteer leadership. Florence Murphy, Board member-at-large, has been named Membership Committee chair to replace Leslie Back. Leslie, who became Membership chair last November, had to undertake some unexpected family obligations; she hopes to return to Omnilore activities when feasible. Florence will be working closely with Linda Jenson, vice-president of Administration. In addition. Bill Gargaro will chair the Website Working Group. Jim Slattery and Frank Reiner will be coordinators for the Automated External Defibrillator (AED) training and are looking for volunteers. (See related article in this Newsletter.)

Work continues on the 25th Anniversary Initiative on several fronts. Linda Jenson, vice-president of Administration, and Carol Johnson, office manager, are leading a review and revision of Omnilore governance documents -- our by-laws, operating rules and procedures -- to bring them into alignment with changed circumstances and organizational needs. Input has been provided by a number of individuals and committees. Linda, Carol and I were named as the committee to conduct the preliminary review and revisions. The committee met February 27 to begin the process of reviewing input and then integrate the

various recommendations. Once the committee review has been completed, the committee will submit recommended changes for Board review and approval. Revisions in the by-laws will be submitted to the membership for review in the September newsletter. Final approval of revisions will be voted on at our annual general meeting, which will take place in conjunction with the October Forum.

Lori Geittmann, Forum Committee chair, has begun planning for the 25th Anniversary celebration at the July 30 Forum. She and the Forum Committee will be leading preparations for the event. Any suggestions or ideas for the celebration should be directed to Lori (catcalico@aol.com).

Our Newsletter editor, Mary Golob, and the Communications Committee have begun work on committee organization in relation to internal and external communications. The committee has several members and a number of volunteers who contribute to specific areas of committee responsibilities.

On another front, the Ad Hoc Plan B Committee, chaired by Rick Spillane and including Linda Jenson, Kathleen Fitzgerald, Howard Korman, Gary Nofziger, Jim Slattery, Bill Gargaro, Leslie Criswell, Bob Bragonier, and me, has continued looking into facility alternatives. Among locations considered have been adult school sites in Redondo Beach and Torrance, service club facilities, a church community center, the Hermosa Beach Community Center, Torrance Cultural Arts Center, a significant sampling of commercial property locations and CSUDH campus facilities. A volunteer realtor has scouted several realty firms with significant commercial space but no positive outcomes.

Parking has emerged as a big factor from the standpoint of Omnilore members' needs and what commercial properties and other locations have to



offer. City and school district facilities have established calendars of activities, as well as specific days or periods of closure, which are not suited to Omnilore needs. Required calendar adjustments at the Edison Center are a good example of the effects of the differences in the activities calendars. The committee will continue to look at options.

The Website Working Group has been involved in reviewing aspects of our website functions and content and will continue on improvements. **Dennis Goodno** has uploaded copies of the newsletter dating back to the first newsletter, in 1992, and is working on upload of Board meeting minutes. **Hal Hart**, who shares the webmaster duties with Dennis, has been working on updates to several areas of the website, including addition of the 25th Anniversary logo.

An outstanding roster of Summer SDG offerings has been compiled by the Curriculum Committee, chaired by Rick Spillane. Curriculum development is undertaken with a great deal of thought and care. Meticulous consideration is given to course content, readings and other curriculum support materials, diversity of course offerings, and potential interest. Some 18 volunteers participate in the Curriculum Committee with intensity, dedication, and conscientious attention to detail. As a result, we have an excellent intellectual environment planned for our Summer. I hope you remembered to send in your choices for this trimester that starts May 1.

These tasks include: inserting a picture into a slide; inserting music into a slide (to play on one slide or on a series of slides); inserting a YouTube clip (in real time) into a slide; inserting a downloaded video clip into a slide; using sequential bullets; animating arrows, and as many things as we have time for. As he goes along, he will highlight minor differences between 2003, 2007, and 2010 versions of PowerPoint. Plan to come early and bring your laptop to follow along with Bob; also, don't forget to bring along questions and concerns you have experienced during your own PowerPoint adventures!

Call for Volunteers:

Automated External Defibrillator (AED) Training News

Jim Slattery and **Frank Reiner** have been named coordinators for the Automated External Defibrillator (AED) training to be held this Spring. Jim has had the training and was Omnnilore's treasurer for three years. Frank, a relatively new member, serves on the Board of Directors as a member-at-large. A member of the Curriculum Committee, he also helps recruit SDG coordinators and co-coordinators.



AED training was established by the Omnilore Board of Directors several years ago to ensure quick response should an Omnilore member experience a cardiac emergency.

No Omnilore member has had such an emergency, but the Board would like to be prepared if one should occur, and use of AED has been found to improve outcomes in such situations. AED equipment was purchased, and training is paid for, through Omnilore's annual operating budget as approved by the Board.

AED training is conducted by a member of the Redondo Beach Fire Department. Trained members are certified to use the AED equipment in case of emergency need by an Omnilore member. Certification is for a two-year period and the long-range goal is to have overlapping periods of certification to provide for sufficient AED volunteers throughout the year. We currently have 30 certified members, all with 2016 expiration dates on their certifications, and we

would like to recruit 15 new volunteers for a training class in the Spring of 2015.


Change is Inevitable — except from a vending machine...



March 2: Fiction Maisie Dobbs by Jacqueline Winspear

This month we reach back to the first book written in the highly-regarded Maisie Dobbs mystery series. Maisie is a "psychologist and investigator" in post World War I London who untangles painful and shameful secrets stemming from war experiences. A nurse during the war, Maisie returned to London to work with her mentor, accomplished detective Dr. Maurice Blanche. When Blanche retires, Maisie opens her own detective agency. The novel was nominated for several awards and received the 2003 Agatha Award for Best First Novel.




April: NO BOOK CLUB SESSION due to the Edison Center being closed on the first Monday of the month.



May 4: Non-Fiction – *Ghettoside* by Jill Leovy (This is a tentative date. The SIG may move to another day of the week to try to avoid scheduling conflicts...stay tuned!)

Jill Leovy, award-winning reporter and editor for the Los Angeles Times, has written a penetrating look at the L.A. Police Department in her recent best seller. She tracks the daily movements of homicide detectives working cases that rarely attract the media spotlight. Believing that "every victim has a story" and that many homicides are unreported to the public, she created the L.A. Times blog Homicide Report where she identified the name and circumstances of each homicide victim in the city. In her book, she personalizes her message by tracing one of Detective John Skaggs's homicide cases: the murder of Bryant Tennelle, the son of an African-American detective on the L.A. Police force. It serves as a crucial reminder that "black lives matter" and how "the system's failure to catch killers effectively makes black lives cheap." Homicide remains the #1 cause of death for African-American males ages 15-34. It should provide for some interesting discussion!



Clash of Civilizations over an Elevator in Piazza Vittoria, by Amara Lakhous. A small, culturally mixed community living in an apartment building in Rome is thrown into disarray when one of the tenants is murdered. Each of the neighbors is questioned by the police and we hear their stories from their unique point of view. A moving story of life spent on society's margins told in a sensitive and at times humorous manner. Thought provoking.

Pines, by Blake Crouch is a thriller, a can't-put-it-down, holding-my-eyelidsopen-with-toothpicks kind of book; and it's only book one of a trilogy. Its hero wakes up in the woods near a small, quaint town, not knowing how he got there, but things get stranger and stranger as he picks up clues along the way. Again and again he shows himself to be a survivor, even with the whole town hunting him down, and the only road out of town leading nowhere. The old saying, "You can't get there from here," takes on several new meanings as people change identities and seem to travel in time (an illusion somewhat like feeling you're in a slowly moving train, until you realize it's another train moving past your window). I can't say any more without spoiling the tale, so I just hope I've whetted your appetite on this one!

How Adam Smith Can Change Your Life: An Unexpected Guide to Human Nature and Happiness, by Russ Roberts. Adam Smith wrote two books, the well-known An Inquiry into the Nature and Causes of the Wealth of Nations and The Theory of Moral Sentiments. In the recommended volume, Roberts takes the lesser known book and translates its key points into modern English and adds an insightful commentary. In some cases it really is better to read about an author's work than read the original; this is one of those cases. Not only does the present book give wonderful insights into human nature and the pursuit of happiness, but also new appreciation for Smith and a better understanding of Wealth of Nations. Highly recommended.

Threat Vector by **Tom Clancy** addresses cyber warfare against the U.S. by – who else? – China, of course! Although this was written a few years ago, the worry generally building in our minds that we are not in any way ready for this scenario is mirrored admirably in this story where hundreds of trained hackers attack our country in coordination with military

thrusts aimed at extending China's authority beyond its current borders. Two leaders combine to bring Taiwan, Hong Kong and the South China Sea area back into their country's control, one believing this is China's destiny and the other to compensate for the impending collapse of their economy. Clancy delivers his signature complicated and nail -biting storytelling, which includes jamming satellites, interfering with military communications and attacking our infrastructure.

How to Sit by **Thich Nhat Hanh**. This is a tiny book on meditation and mindfulness that captures the essence of (Zen) meditation. The author writes: Sitting meditation has two aspects. The first is stopping and calming. The second is looking deeply.

And when we do sitting meditation, we don't think that we're doing sitting meditation in order to become a Buddha. We sit to be happy. We sit merely to be there, to have the awareness that we are there, that the wonderful world is there, inside us and around us. If we sit like that, that is happiness already, and that is mindfulness.
