Lisa will be our speaker at our Annual Membership Meeting and Forum Luncheon on Monday, October, 31. This probably will nudge our attendees to come as their favorite Shakespearean character.

The nonprofit organization presents ten weeks of Shake-spearean plays in twenty outdoor locations from El Segundo to San Pedro during the summer. The players perform one comedy one night and one tragedy the next. Admission is free and the crowds are enthusiastic, probably like the original Shakespeare audiences.

She also manages and produces the Little Fish Theater in San Pedro, a 60-seat venue...but more about that later. Her organization's mission is:

To create theatrical experiences for audiences in culturally diverse communities to make theatre accessible to all.

To provide theatre presentations that incorporate community values and ideas into a timeless and dynamic theatrical experience.

To ignite imagination, promote literacy, and encourage artistic expression, while offering a venue for technical and performing artists to exercise their passion.

Lisa has a Bachelor's degree in Fine Arts from California State University Sacramento and her Master's in Fine Arts from California State University Long Beach.

Thanks to **Johan Smith** for her unstinting, long term administrative support. She has been and is an important part of Omnilore functions.

I also want to thank and recognize as Omnilore leaders the coordinators and co-coordinators, who have volunteered and continue to volunteer their time and effort to contribute to Omnilore's success. They are and have been at the core of Omnilore's success for more than a quarter century at this point. And we cannot forget all of the committee members who develop and implement our curriculum, organize and host the Forums, publish the newsletter and other communications, maintain technology and our website, assist with membership recruitment and orientation, and contribute through ad hoc groups in areas such as budget and finance.

I thank the CSUDH and College of Extended and International Education administrative team members for their trust and support with Omnilore's functions, as well as the OLLI endeavors. There are thanks due to Dean Kim McNutt for support of our relocation to the Beach Cities Health Center, which he has made a cost-free endeavor for Omnilore. During my first year, Teresa Stevens was our primary contact, as the CEIE experienced a massive staffing change. She has been outstanding throughout the process of CEIE changeover and our own

relocation. Aside from her great support, Teresa is effectively part of Omnilore history given that, as administrative assistant to **Dean Gordon**, in 1992 she worked on the documentation of Omnilore's association with the College and CSUDH. **Ed Cleek** has worked with us to get the Omnilore-CEIE interface back to where it had been, including detailed financial reports sent to our treasurer. And there are thanks to **Garth Kwiecien** and **John Tamura** of the Procurement office for their part in getting our lease and other items done.

Beach Cities Here We Are

After a two-year search and a significant time investment on the part of a team of volunteers, we have settled into our new home. The Beach Cities Health Center, which is owned by the Beach Cities Health District, is a significant improvement over our experience at our previous location. The improvement has been noticeable in terms of the morale of Omnilore members. All members with whom I have spoken have said how pleased they are with the move.

However, we are not completely settled in as the College of Extended and International Education, our institutional home at CSUDH, and the Beach Cities Health District (BCHD) complete their own endeavors. Signage will be updated by the BCHD, which takes care of the "common areas" of the Beach Cities Health Center. The CEIE will be installing wall-mounted screens, white-boards and bulletin boards as it prepares for the scheduling of Extension classes, and plans are to employ a cleaning service. Omnilore has a detail or two to finish the move, but S/DGs are functioning and members are satisfied.

The results of team effort are noteworthy and there are many to thank. By my count there have been about twenty members involved in the move and others who supported the effort in one way or another. Those directly involved include the two "iron men" of the move, Hal Hart and Jim Slattery, and a "movers team" which included in alphabetical order: Linda Jenson, Carol Johnson, Joy Jurena, Howard Korman, Kent McDonald, Florence

Murphy, Jade Neely, Frank Pohlner, Frank Reiner, Lori Spillane, Rick Spillane, Mary Watson and me (out of alpha order).

our equipment co-managers, took on the job of sorting, packing and moving every piece of equipment, then installing it so we can use it with minimal effort. The "movers team" helped sort, pack, move and unpack the various non-equipment items and took on other tasks as needed. **Teresa Stevens** contributed to the move in a number of ways, including coming to the Center on weekends to get things done. Conversations, emails and phone calls with her helped keep us on track and she still is working with us to finalize details of the move.

Board Nominations on Tap

This is the time of year Omnilore leadership is subject to change and this year we will have significant change. Our Board officers have all completed their terms and the Nominations Committee has engaged in a search for 2016-17 Board The Committee considered candidates. candidates who have demonstrated skills or experience which fit needs in specific positions. Omnilore Profile—Kate Nelson

ave you taken an Omnilore class with Kate Nelson? Maybe one of the Shakespeare classes? Or a class that studies the brain? Or an art or music class? For most terms, Kate takes two S/DGs. Or you may recognize Kate's name from the many profiles she's written for Omnilore News.

A native of Portland, Oregon, Kate spent three years at the University of Oregon before obtaining bachelor's and master's degrees from CSU Los Angeles, which she earned after moving to Los Angeles as a young bride.

Kate started her career as a very young (21 year old) English teacher

at Bishop Conaty High School at Pico and Western in Los Angeles. After being reprimanded by the principal on her first day on the job with the words "Young lady—get to your classroom!", Kate adopted a drab middle-aged wardrobe so as to avoid being confused with a student in the future. Note: She no longer abides by that wardrobe choice.

She then worked for 27 years at Mira Costa High School, initially as an English teacher, then as Activities Director and Counselor, and ultimately, as Vice Principal. Her career in education expanded by her serving as Principal of the South Bay Adult School for five years, and then moving to the position of Assistant Superintendent of the Manhattan Beach



Unified School District (MBUSD). Kate retired 15 years ago from her position at MBUSD.

Kate's son (from her first marriage) lives in Atlanta, GA with his wife and three sons. Kate's husband, Jim Ruderman has a daughter and a seven-year-old granddaughter who live in Vancouver, British Columbia. As you can imagine, the locations of their family provide Kate and Jim an opportunity to enjoy trips to many parts of the United States and western Canada. And when she's not in class, Kate and Jim enjoy going to movies and opera.

When she's in town, Kate plays tennis at least once a week, and she

has belonged to a book club for 25 years. She volunteers for the Manhattan Beach Older Adult Program, participating recently in a program called Coffee, Tech, and You. In this innovative program, high school AP calculus students mentor senior citizens—for example, a student shows a senior how to use her/his cell phone. This program recently won a well-deserved statewide award for "best intergenerational program". And until recently, Kate served as Chair of the Senior Advisory Committee for the City of Manhattan Beach.

In Memoriam

Kathleen Whitehead

athleen was born and raised right here in Los Angeles, attending LA High School with her siblings. She had to cut her education short, leaving UCLA to help her family through the Depression, although she finished her education at other institutions later on. She met her husband during the 1933 earthquake while living in Long Beach. Kathleen's husband, William "Bill" Whitehead, served in the Navy for 2½ years. After World

War II, they moved to Manhattan Beach where she eventually lived for more than 70 years in one residence.

Kathleen was well known for her lifelong commitment to community activities ranging from Scouts to senior education. She joined Omnilore about 2007, and loved anything about music. She was 96.

Bernard Gee

ernard Gee joined Omnilore four years ago after a long and distinguished career in the medical profession, retiring most recently from teaching medicine at Yale University where he specialized in pulmonary and occupational lung diseases. A native of England, he came to our country in 1961 where he taught at the schools of medicine at both Wisconsin and Pittsburgh Universities before moving on to Yale.

Bernard loved travel, witty conversation, good food and

good wine, along with the companionship of friends and family. He enjoyed imparting his great love of classical music, opera and books to others. He and his also an Omnilorean, took classes together, enjoying Shakespeare and studying current issues concerning our country. He was 89.

Ricky Baker, (Julian Dennison) is a 13 year old rebellious, defiant city kid who is sent by child welfare services to live in the country with yet another set of foster parents, Aunt Bella (Rima Te Wiata) and a grumpy Uncle Hec (Sam Neil). He's been to many foster homes and this is the last one before juvenile detention.

The movie is divided into novelistic chapters with titles such as "The Bad Egg," "War" or "Broken Foot Camp." It is a perfectly balanced blend of drama, comedy, action and heart. And it gets better, with veteran actor Sam Neil teamed with Julien Dennison, the actor playing Ricky Baker, and director Taika Waititi – all three award winning New Zealanders.

Ricky is unhappy with his new home and surroundings, a dilapidated cottage in the middle of New Zealand. Although Aunt Bella does all the right things to make him happy, comfortable and cared for, he attempts to run away and hide in the unforgiving wilderness. Cantankerous Uncle Hec has to find him and bring him home.

Due to unfortunate circumstances (and for reasons I won't explain for fear of spoiling the plot) this difficult, hard to handle foster kid from the big city and a grouchy, 60 year old man from rural New Zealand are made to forge an unlikely alliance to survive in the New Zealand Wilderness as they are forced to be on the run. What ensues is a funny and heartwarming experience as they are pushed to get over their differences to survive, and we watch as they slowly build a warm and trusting relationship.

Rotten Tomatoes gave it 99%.

Nightcrawler is a crime thriller written and directed by first timer Dan Gilroy.

Nightcrawler was easily one of the most underrated films of 2014. Jake Gyllenhaal gives a career-best performance in this nocturnal noir film. I really loved this movie and thought it brilliant on many levels.

A creepy, petty thief and night drifter,

Louis Bloom (Jake Gyllenhaal) is living on the fringes. He is out of work, looking for a job. After stumbling upon a pre-dawn car wreck, he spots a cameraman (Bill Praxton) recording the bloodbath. Hours later he sees the same images on the morning news. Finally Louis Bloom has a job.

With just a camcorder and a police radio scanner he starts recording the aftermath of a fatal carjacking, and sells the footage to a local station where he meets the morning news director Nina (Rene Russo). He starts shooting live footage of accidents and crimes in Los Angeles. He muscles his way into the world of L.A. crime journalism, and starts rearranging the crime scenes, blurring the lines between observer and participant to become the star of his own story. The idea that such work is invasive, maybe illegal and immoral never troubles him. The movie depicts how news reporting uses blood and guts and anything and everything awful to increase readership at all costs.

Most interesting and frightening of all is the relationship between Nina and Lou. "The movie is about psychological manipulation over plot twists," according the one movie reviewer.

1 hen you join Omnilore, you also become a student of the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) at the CSU, Dominguez Hills (CSUDH) College of Extended and International Education (CEIE). You are assigned a student identification number (OLLI student ID/registration number) through the College and are issued a paper OLLI identification card with the number and a sticker to verify current enrollment. But, you may want to get a student photo ID card, which is required on campus for all transactions and use of the University Library, Admissions and Records, and Student Health Center. Whether you obtain the OLLI ID card or student photo ID card, a student ID card containing the student ID number is unique and assigned to each Omnilore / OLLI member for life.



New, Simplified, No Setup, No Storage Omnilore Equipment Usage

n our new classrooms at the Beach Cities Health facility, we are going to try leaving our primary presentation equipment (projector, desktop presenter, Windows laptop, 3-microphone system) set up, cabled up, and plugged in all the time. This should eliminate most of the human error we think has been responsible for the increased equipment failures we have experienced in recent years. This is an experiment and we appreciate member reports of problems, improvement suggestions, and other feedback.

Here are the simple steps to get presentation equipment going, and then to shut it down when done:

AT START OF CLASS: Find equipment ready-to-go on tables (projector on a cart in Suite B)

- 1. Turn ON Power Strip
- 2. Push left button to turn ON projector
- 3. Presenter should go to table at front left, angled in front of screen, to use the desktop presenter or laptop *OR*
 - Use a cable from extra-equipment table (front left corner) to cable personal laptop or tablet to the projector
- 4. Choose one of three microphones to use from that angled-at-front table (spare 9V batteries are on extra-equipment table)
- 5. Be sure projector is aligned & sized to project on wall/screen

For internet usage, connect to wifi network "CSUDH-Suite A" or "CSUDH-Suite B" with the same network password we have used for all our wifi networks since 2009.

WHEN DONE WITH EQUIPMENT: Leave angled table and all primary equipment in place.

- 1. Hit left button on projector twice to turn OFF projector and start cool-down (orange light blinks during cool-down)
- 2. Turn OFF hand-held mic and transmitter for other 2 mics. Leave microphone speaker box plugged in & turned ON.
- 3. Shut Down laptop (if used)
- 4. Leave desktop presenter & laptop on table at front-left of screen; return extra cables to other table (or cart in Suite B)
- 5. When projector fan turns OFF and orange light goes solid, turn OFF power strip.

FREEDOM OF TABLES:

When presentation equipment is not being used, if you want to arrange tables into a more intimate rectangle or other arrangement for oral presentations and discussion/question periods, feel free to move the table or cart with the projector out of the middle of the room and closer to the angled table. All our tables have wheels and are easy to rearrange as desired.

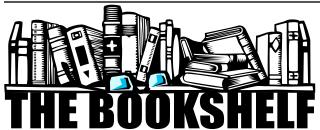
My First Omnilore S/DG—by Teddie Milner

In *The Enemy Inside*, Steve Martini's main character – a lawyer named Paul Madriani – takes on a seemingly simple DUI case as a favor, never guessing the twists and turns and complications that will develop. It ends up a study of greed and corruption that underlies many in Washington and the lengths some will go

to maintain their ability to amass money and power. The DUI happened in California, yet killed a D.C. lawyer who was involved in this web of intrigue and whose law firm colleague plots to bury her dark secrets with her. An assassin, cutting edge auto electronics, blackmail, off-shore bank accounts, untouchable bosses, senators and lobbyists all play their parts in this intricate drama, culminating, as ever, in Madriani saving his daughter's friend and several others.

Continued from Page 5, **About Our College IDs:** Photo ID cards are available in the Office of Admissions and Records, WH C290. The \$5.00 photo ID card fee is payable at the Welch Hall Cashier Office. Bring your fee receipt showing proof of payment of the ID card fee, as well as a second picture ID (driver's license, high school ID, etc.) to Admissions and Records. Your card is validated each semester by placing the current enrollment fee sticker in the upper right-hand corner of the card. The validation sticker can be obtained at the Extended Education Registration Office by the Extended Ed classrooms.

In recent months, several Omnilore members have raised concerns about the validation sticker and the student ID card. The major concern has been that, after paying their yearly Omnilore /OLLI membership, they had not received their new student ID card and/or validation sticker. They did not know everyone must obtain the OLLI card and/or the sticker at the Extended Education Registration Office. There is no reason to request a new card, especially if you have a photo ID card, unless your card has been lost, damaged or stolen. OLLI Registration will only issue new OLLI cards and stickers to new Omnilore / OLLI members, or per your request for a new card and/or current validation sticker.

We hope to establish an effective procedure for providing Omnilore members their validation stickers after renewing their yearly Omnilore /OLLI membership. But, please note the OLLI Registration database knows that you are a current and fully paid Omnilore / OLLI member. Therefore, unless you attend OLLI courses, field trips and events, there is no requirement for Omnilore members to obtain a validation sticker.
