The musical is a tribute to 27 women who dared to fight for their rights, starting in 1591, extending to 1920 in Tennessee where the Suffragette fight culminated with the ratification of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment. ## **Omnilore Profile: Susan Strauss**



Being able to learn new skills, geriatric specialists tell us, is essential to maintaining an active mind.


Omnilore provides us with the essential ingredients to thrive.

### In Memoriam - Ruth Bloland

Ruth Marion Nolte was born in Wisconsin in January 1929. She lived a remarkable 95 years, leaving behind a legacy of love, learning, and adventure.

Ruth's educational journey began at the University of Wisconsin, where she earned her BA. She furthered her studies with a Master of Science in Education from Drake University and completed her PhD in Education at the University of Southern California.

Her passion for teaching led her to a fulfilling career as a high school mathematics teacher, a role she embraced with dedication until her retirement. Even after retiring, Ruth continued to share her love for learning by tutoring students for many years.

In 1951, Ruth married Paul A. Bloland, with whom she shared a deep and enduring partnership until his passing



in 1998. They had two sons: Eric who became a medical doctor, and Peter who became a veterinarian with two degrees. They moved to Southern California when Paul became a professor at USC.

Ruth was an avid traveler, having explored over 100 countries throughout her lifetime. Her journeys were marked by a keen interest in collecting folk art, reflecting her appreciation for diverse cultures and traditions. She also found joy in hiking, river rafting, and canoeing. Later in life, Ruth discovered a new passion for running, becoming a dedicated runner and completing several marathons.

She will be remembered for her indomitable spirit, intellectual curiosity, and the joy she brought to those around her.

Ruth joined Omnilore in April 2007 and left after 2014 to attend to some health issues. She was 85 when she left our membership. She passed away on August 7, 2024, at her home in Rancho Palos Verdes, surrounded by her sons and the love of her life, a poodle named McGee.




